- Opening date April 9 2018

- Each person will have access to 1 single bin
- There will be a check in process staffed and organized by the Kamloops Aboriginal Friendship Society
- Clients will have to check in every few months to continue to keep their stuff in storage either by phone, 3rd party or in person
- There will be security protocols in place
- Eventually will have laundry: 1 washer 2 dryers
- There will be no storage for shopping carts
- Possibility of expanding to house mail services
- In the process of gathering information for hours of operation
- At a later date there will be opportunity for local agencies to set up tours

The Out of the Cold has been averaging about 20-30 beds a night Wednesdays and Sundays. They have been working well with Stuart Wood to make sure all folks needing a warm place to stay have been looked after. A positive note that there we no fentanyl overdoses this season at the Out of the Cold shelter.

3. Poverty Law

In response to a letter sent to Honourable Shane Simpson, Minister of Social Development, last fall by BC Public Interest Advocacy Centre (**BCPIAC**) the EAAT (**Employment and Assistance Appeal Tribunal**) is conducting a review and consulting with BC Legal Advocates and Non-Profit Legal Aid societies (CLAS, TAPS, TRAC) roughly along the lines of the points made in the letter to Mr. Simpson. The original letter was spurred by the alarming drop in successful appeals to EAAT over the last 13 years, from 38% to 7.6%.
